Architectural Concept

When Dutch architect Francine HOUBEN visited Weiwuying for the first time, she was fascinated by the group of hundred-year-old banyan trees there. With their twisted roots, gnarled branches, and large crowns standing high, these trees offered protection from the scorching sun and summer afternoon thunderstorms, allowing people to chat, practice boxing, and play Chinese chess. These images mesmerized HOUBEN and became deeply embedded in her mind.

Located next to the Weiwuying Metropolitan Park, the National Kaohsiung Center for the Arts (Weiwuying) covers 9.9 hectares and is the world's largest single-roof multi-venue performing arts center. Inspired by the banyan trees from the park, the building's flowing curves evoke the imagery of ocean waves, symbolizing the openness and freedom of the performing arts. The Banyan Plaza features the Opera House, Concert Hall, Playhouse, Recital Hall, and an open outdoor theater with the sky as its curtain and the grass as its seating. The ideas of openness, penetration, and tolerance conveyed by the banyan trees were incorporated into the overall architectural design, inviting visitors to come in and relish in the art found in every corner.

24 Hours Composer series

The inspiration for the 24 Hours series, a marathon of classical music, came from France's iconic music festival La Folle Journée, at which an unbelievable number of classical music performances go on over the course of several days. Based on that, Weiwuying launched its own concentrated version in 2022, choosing to highlight one composer each year for 24 straight hours so that fans may enjoy programs all night long and into the next day.

Weiwuying Organ Festival

The Weiwuying Concert Hall has the largest pipe organ in Asia. Every year, Weiwuying holds an organ music festival, inviting famous pipe organ experts to curate and perform different styles of music such as solo, chamber music, and concertos. The festival aims to immerse the audience in the brilliant music and show them why the pipe organ is known as the "King of Instruments".

Weiwuying International Music Festival

Having begun in 2022, the Weiwuying International Music Festival is rooted in Taiwan and international, diverse, and innovative in nature. Different genres from different eras are presented, from the classical to the most frontline contemporary music. The potpourri of performances, lectures, and workshops makes it a platform of creation for Taiwanese musicians and art.

Weiwuying Children's Festival

The Weiwuying Children's Festival, which goes on every summer, is a great time hosted by Weiwuying's Lulu and friends for children and adults alike. The performances, workshops, and parades bring the performing arts closer to kids and inspire their creativity.

Taiwan Dance Platform

Presenting performances biannually, the Taiwan Dance Platform spans the internal and external areas of the Weiwuying performance halls and building, showcasing a diverse array of dance forms from multiple cultures and genres. It is also a venue for dance workshops that explore the human body through the five senses, kinesthetic awareness, and breakthrough physical feats in a search for vitality and even the meaning of life.

Weiwuying Circus Platform

Contemporary circuses are no longer about trainers, elephants, and clowns. The subjects of Weiwuying's new circus are people and the amazing things they do, including diabolos, parkour, juggling, and aerial and physical stunts. Eurasian forums and seminars held at campuses throughout Taiwan are also initiated here.

BANYAN PLAZA

The Banyan Plaza, Weiwuying's "living room," includes four performance halls and an outdoor theater. The plaza has a curved, smooth tree bark-inspired ceiling. There are no fences or walls, so visitors may enter, exit, and interact freely, creating a "symphony" with the sounds they generate.

OPERA HOUSE

2,236 seats

Equipped with seats arranged in the form of a horseshoe, the Opera House is Taiwan's first large-scale opera house featuring computeraided operations; it is also Taiwan's biggest opera house. It boasts fully automated stage machinery and equipment, an orchestra pit lift measuring nearly 80 m², and the capacity to accommodate a full orchestra.

CONCERT HALL

1,981 seats

The Concert Hall is the home of Taiwan's largest pipe organ, which was made by a century-old German manufacturer. It consists of 9,085 pipes and blends harmoniously with the concert hall design. Hanging above the stage is an acoustic shell that can be raised or lowered, the instrument delivers an unprecedented acoustic experience. The stage is encircled by vineyard-style seating, allowing the audience to revel in the allure of the conductors and performers from up close.

PLAYHOUSE

1,209 seats

The Playhouse is a versatile, diversified theater with a proscenium and thrust stage, an orchestra pit lift, and removable seats that make for a rich and constantly changing theater space. The main color is a romantic, low-key indigo-purple that radiates a sense of elegance and quality.



RECITAL HALL

434 seats


The Recital Hall is mainly used for chamber music, recitals, and mini concerts. Contrary to traditional shoebox-shaped concert halls, the auditorium has an asymmetric shoebox-shaped design to allow sound waves to be reflected directly. Perforated wooden panels on the upper half of the building and a carefully planned acoustic design sound-absorbing drapery behind the wood chips to adjust how the sound is absorbed according to the performance content, heightening the sound quality.


OUTDOOR THEATER


Located to the south of the main structure and adjacent to the Weiwuying Metropolitan Park, the Outdoor Theater, with the sky as its curtain and the grass as its seating, is a curved structure that stretches from the ground to the roof. Here, visitors can enjoy a view of Kaohsiung's natural beauty, which is magical and utterly breathtaking at dusk. This atypical theater is an "experiment" conducted by Weiwuying to invite everyone to open their minds and embrace the beauty of nature.


FLOOR PLAN

By car

Southbound

Via National Freeway 1

Get off at the Zhongzheng Rd. Exit → Turn left at the end of the offramp, which will take you toward Fongshan District → Continue along Zhongzheng 1st Rd. → Turn right at Sec. 2, Guotai Rd. and stay in the low-speed lane until you arrive at Weiwuying.

Via National Freeway 3

Get onto National Freeway 10 from National Freeway 3 → Then get onto National Freeway 1 → Get off at the Zhongzheng Rd. Exit → Turn left at the end of the offramp, which will take you toward Fongshan District → Continue along Zhongzheng 1st Rd. → Turn right at Sec. 2, Guotai Rd. and stay in the low-speed lane until you arrive at Weiwuying.

Northbound

Via National Freeway 1

Get off at the Sanduo Rd. Exit → Turn right at the end of the offramp, which will take you toward Fongshan District → Continue along Sanduo 1st Rd. until you arrive at Weiwuying.

Via National Freeway 3

Get onto Provincial Highway 88 from National Freeway 3 → Then get onto National Freeway 1 → Get off at the Sanduo Rd. Exit → Turn right at the end of the offramp, which will take you toward Fongshan District → Continue along Sanduo 1st Rd. until you arrive at Weiwuying.

By Kaohsiung Metro

Take the orange line and get off at Weiwuying Metro Station (O10); use Exit 6 (Weiwuying is to the right of Exit 6).

By Taiwan Railways

Get off at Kaohsiung Main Station and take the Kaohsiung Metro. Please refer to the "By Kaohsiung Metro" section for additional directions.

By the Taiwan High Speed Rail

Get off at Zuoying Station and take the Kaohsiung Metro. Please refer to the "By Kaohsiung Metro" section for additional directions.

By plane

After arriving at Kaohsiung International Airport, take the Kaohsiung Metro. Please refer to the "By Kaohsiung Metro" section for additional directions.

By bus

Take Kaohsiung City buses 52 or 70 and get off at the National Kaohsiung Center for the Arts (Weiwuying) bus stop; or take buses 50, 53A/53B, 88, 248, O7A/O7B/O8/O10/O11, R21, 8001, or Y2A/Y2B/Y2C and get off at Jianjyun Station.
